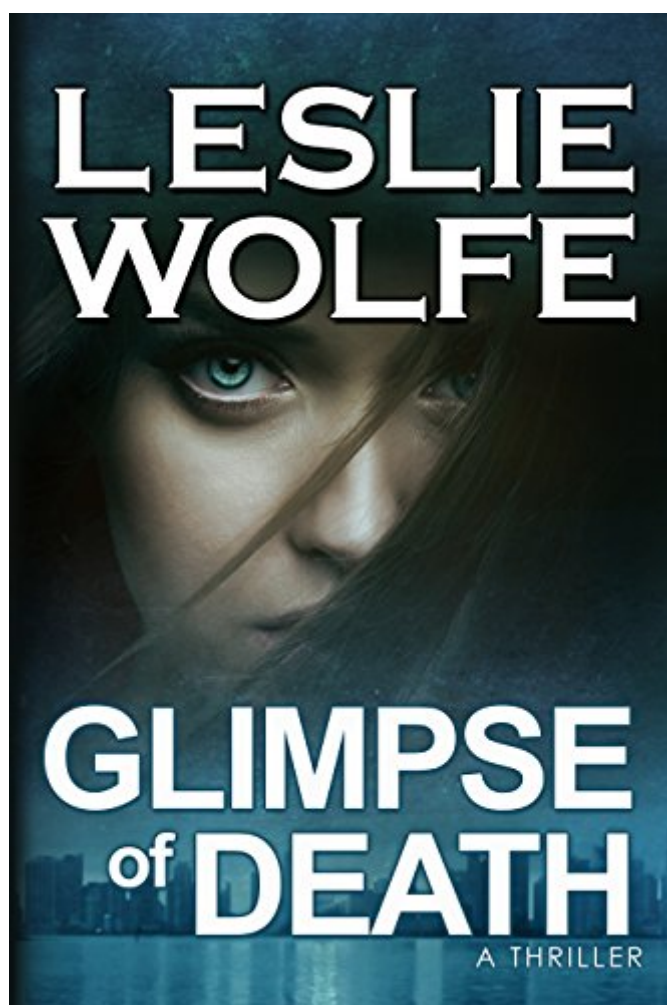


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Glimpse Of Death: A Riveting Serial Killer Thriller

A Glimpse of Death was a decent read but my least favorite in this three part series by Leslie Wolfe. If it was possible, I'd give it 3.5 stars. It is a fact that crime never stops even for FBI Agent Tess Winnett who is convalescing in the hospital after her heroic and successful close to The

Watson Girl Case (from Book 2 of the series). She joins forces again with local detectives Michowsky and Fradella as they seek her help on their latest case. Now that Winnett has worked a few cases with Michowsky and Fradella, she knows they are both capable detectives, yet through her frustration, she is still very critical of them at times. She catches herself, but usually only after the fact. This seemed a bit overdone since she was just as much at a loss as they were when it came to actually finding something concrete to help them solve the case. That being said, little by little they pieced together some very important clues, most importantly that these serial killers have been at it for a much longer time than they realized. Yes, serial killers...plural! What's worse than having one crazed unstable person on the loose committing heinous crimes? Having at least two of them working together like a well-oiled machine. This case goes from bad to worse when the latest target is someone Agent Winnett knows personally. As the clues come together ever-so- slowly, Winnett and the detectives race against the clock to find the killers before they do more than just show their latest victim a glimpse of her impending death.

It's obvious to me that Leslie Wolfe loves to research for her novels, as she puts so many interesting snippets in her books; I feel as if I learn something with each of her books that I read. This book is gripping and intense, and I wanted to speed through it to the end to see if I was right about who the unsub was. I had an inkling, and she hits it out of the park again with this book. There are 2 reasons why this book is a 4 star read instead of a 5 star read, and neither should keep anyone from picking up a copy. First, sometimes the explanations get a bit tedious; if you've seen an episode of Criminal Minds, CSI, or read any police procedural, you don't need things dumbed down or explained in explicit detail. There has to be a fine line between talking above your reader's heads and dumbing things down too much (or explaining too much, if that's a real thing?), but in a few cases in this book, it comes across as the latter. The second criticism I have for this book, is that the ending, or the big reveal is a bit too short for my taste. It's quite a bit better than Dawn Girl, but I still like a bit more bulk to my reveal and climax after all that buildup than just a couple minute's worth; it almost seems like a letdown or a gimme. Otherwise, there isn't much to criticize, and I think that Leslie is a great up-and-coming voice in crime fiction; I've thoroughly enjoyed reading her last couple novels. They're creepy, suspenseful, and highly entertaining, while still being realistic and well-thought out. I was gifted an audiobook copy in exchange for an honest review, so I can't comment on any spelling/grammar issues in the book. The narrator, Andrew Tell is a professional narrator, but I think he could do a bit better in differentiating between characters in dialogue, as there are a few times where it got a bit confusing as to whom was speaking. Otherwise, this was a high quality,

professional recording, and I didn't hear any production/quality issues. This was an enjoyable listen and I couldn't wait to listen more; I wasn't just listening on my daily drives as usual, I was listening while cooking, cleaning, and walking my dogs! I was caught up enough with the ending of *The Watson Girl* and the preview of *Glimpse of Death* to buy it. If only to see how Tess made it out. Typical Tess - she doesn't know what recovery or time off means. She turns her hospital room into a makeshift investigation room to help Michowsky and Fradella solve a case that they realize isn't a single event but the work of a serial killer. Even more terrifying is when they realize there are two working as a team! I liked that Tess was hospital-bound for most of it, though later in the book I had to skim over her parts. Yes I realize she was assaulted but that is still not a license to be a jackass to everyone in her life. More cringe-worthy cheap-shots directed at her partners who are trying to do their jobs the best they can with unknown psychos on the loose. Though of course Tess doesn't know everything either although to her she knows how to do everything better than anyone else. I'd still like to know more about her background and upbringing besides the assault and about her family and personality or if she didn't used to be so off-putting beforehand. The serial killers were frightening. What the women went thru was frightening. Makes you wonder who's really watching you. The nurse was so dumb I was glad when that wrapped up. But overall a good read.

Wow!! This is the second Leslie Wolfe book I've read. The first was so intense I was afraid that the next one would be a disappointment. It definitely was not! It is so intense I not only had a hard time putting it down but had to build up to emerging myself again. If you enjoy mystery thrillers do not miss this one.
