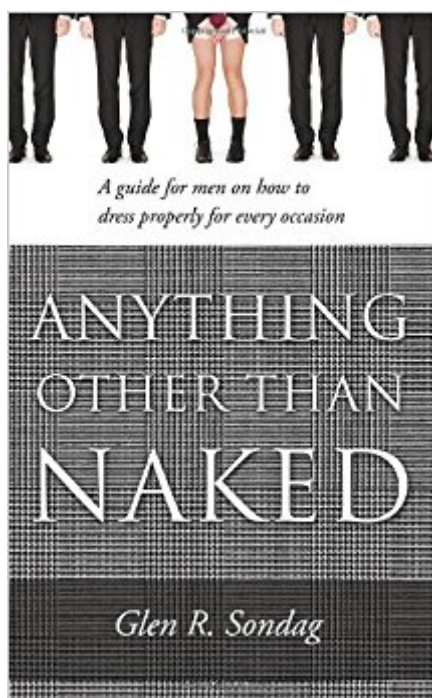

A point worth noting because the title "author" is only part of the word "authority" and there may be a difference in the definition of "author" as there are degrees of quality and "author" selectivity of publishers. But that may also be just snobbery, so avoiding the issue of who is the publisher, who is our author-ity here? Who is our arbiter elegantiarum that leads us into the dark mysteries of men's style? indispensable part of every man's wardrobe, they simply are too casual for the workplace..." First, jeans are not found in every man's wardrobe (thank the fates) and anyone over the age and IQ of 22 probably figured out not to wear jeans as business casual, unless your business is working the printing presses at establishments that refer to themselves as "publishers." Here's a great one: Only tall and slender men should wear double breasted jackets. Really? Lots of dispute over that one. Humphrey Bogart looked pretty good in double breasted, and 5'9" tall isn't exactly pro basketball dimensions. Adolphe Menjou was 5'10" not overly large, and he was one of the silver screen's top dressers. John J. Gotti did double breasted proud in his time, and he wasn't slender or overly tall. I could go on, but the point is made. To be fair, this book could be useful for some rube out of the state where this small work was printed/published who knew nothing at all about men's style basics, but that's about it. The author was also nice enough to supply a full color picture of himself on the back cover. Imagine Bela Lugosi goes to his nephew's bar mitzvah, and you get the idea of how this admittedly handsome and neatly dressed guru of garb wannabe appears. To put all of the above in a sentence: ain't nothin' new under this "sun." Save your shekels and instead of purchasing this, buy a pair of jeans that is part of every man's wardrobe who probably praised this book.

This book shares all the knowledge and expertise gathered over the years by Glen Sondag on how to dress well every day for every occasion. Each chapter takes the reader/student through an item of a man's wardrobe leading him to combine all the elements of dress in a tasteful and elegant manner. Much can be learned by the neophyte building a new wardrobe as he enters the workplace, women who shop for their "man", or the already well-dressed man looking for a new tip or two. All of Glen's wisdom from how to match a tie to a shirt or where to shop for certain hard-to-find articles of clothing is worth much more than the price of this wonderful book.
