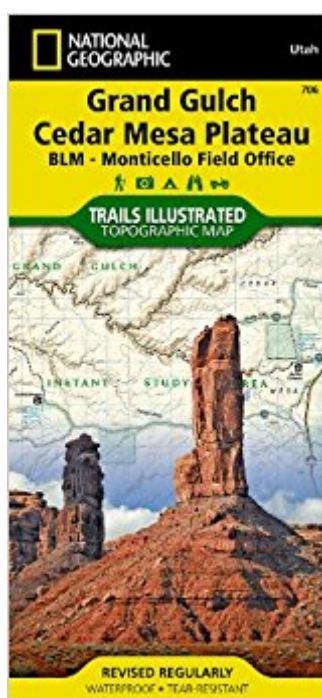

Synopsis

Waterproof Tear-Resistant Topographic Map Grand Gulch is a truly unique, rugged, remote, historic area. National Geographic's Trails Illustrated map of Grand Gulch and the Cedar Mesa Plateau was created in partnership with the Bureau of Land Management to provide unmatched detail and useful information to help you get the most from your visit. The map includes areas around Grand Gulch, including: Fish Creek, Road and Mule Canyons WSA and Glen Canyon National Recreation Area. The print map includes an inset map of Grand Gulch Instant Study Area with special detail of the trail from the Kane Gulch Ranger Station down to the San Juan River. The map includes a table of this 51.7 mile trail, with 43 features and points of interest along the way, including their mileage from the ranger station. The map contains miles of side trails to such places as Government, Bullet Canyon and Collins Spring. In addition to all of this, to help navigate the area, the map has GPS coordinates, contour lines and elevations throughout the trail. Other points of interest that are noted on the map include campsites, scenic views, boat launch locations, trailheads and much more. Visitor information, safety tips and contact information are also included to ensure a safe and enjoyable adventure. Every Trails Illustrated map is printed on "Backcountry Tough" waterproof, tear-resistant paper. A full UTM grid is printed on the map to aid with GPS navigation. Other features found on this map include: Chinle Creek, Comb Ridge, Glen Canyon National Recreation Area, Grand Gulch Plateau, Monument Valley, Red House Cliffs, Valley of the Gods. I truly love Trails Illustrated maps. Except in the desert you really need the quad maps from the USGS. The scale most Trails Illustrated maps are printed at does not provide enough detail to truly find your way around a canyon. Yet they are superb for detailing the roads to the site and getting you to the trail head (marked or unmarked). Yet I do find that the Trails Illustrated maps suffice for the Rocky Mountains. The amount of detail on those maps is enough for this environment. They are often printed at a different scale too.

I went backpacking with a group in Grand Gulch in late March, and this is the map we used. Nat Geo maps, as far as I have seen, are always very high quality and nice to look at. There are no marked trails in Grand Gulch, the map provides mileage markers for the ruins and side-canyon turn offs. This makes it easy to track your mileage/progress in an otherwise winding canyon, where you can't easily tell how far you've gone.

These National Geographic Maps are phenomenal. They feel like a waxy paper but if you try to do a small tear along the edge it stretches instead of tearing like paper so they seem to be made from a plastic paper instead. So that is how they are waterproof and tear proof. I found the detail really good with great hiking information and some geological information on many of these maps.

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
