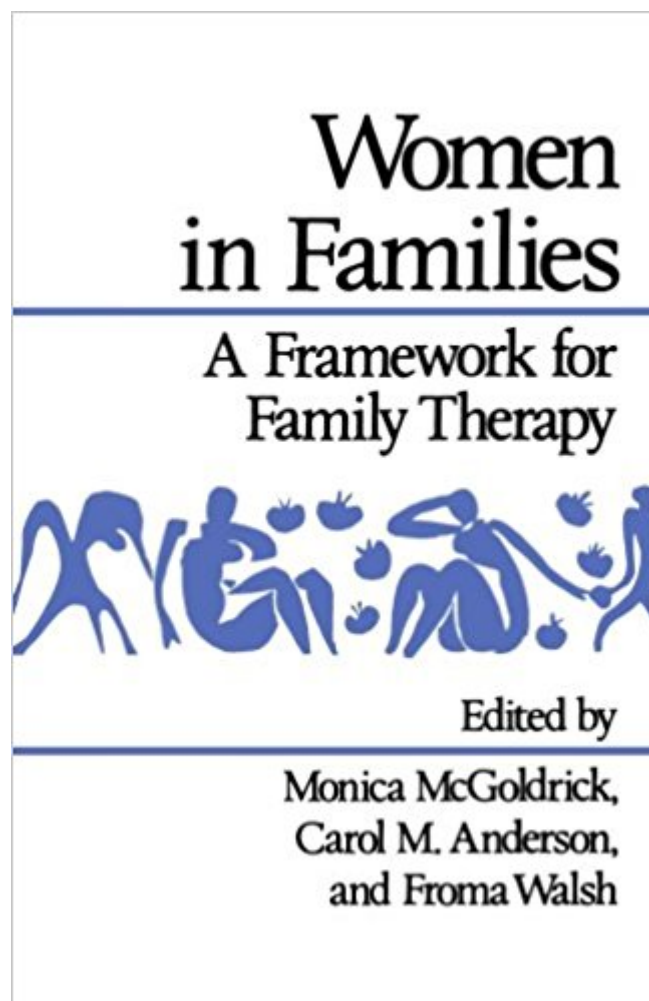




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Women In Families: A Framework For Family Therapy (Norton Professional Books (Paperback))

This book is definitely written from the feminist point of view and contained more opinions than supported data or facts. I found myself shaking my head in disbelief at a large portion of the books. This is a major source of the feminist critique of the marriage and family therapy (MFT) field. The authors deconstruct the gender power-biased theories upon which MFTs draw so that clinicians can choose to be more inclusive in their work by, first, recognizing power processes, and, then, sensitively and empathetically addressing these issues in order to help couples, as well as parents and children, engage in more mutually beneficial relationships.

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
